Or is it no longer being produced? It's one of the few shows I looked at and I think it's a shame that it's gone.

The answers to the questions are something less than conclusive. Mark Evans, who is vice president for public affairs of the Metropolitan Broadcasting Co. in Washington (WTTG), says the station canceled the program because Susskind failed to deliver the taped programs on schedule.

"Some of the shows were far too old and too out-of-date," Mark says.

Susskind claims he offered to give the tape recordings—for free—to the station, in order to have them seen in Washington. Evans says no such offer was made.

Anyway, Metropolitan has its own "John Crosby Show," which is somewhat similar to Susskind's program. Audience reaction to the Crosby Show has been disappointing and it probably will be dropped. Perhaps Susskind and Metropolitan can get together in the future and work out a satisfactory arrangement.

Legal Aid Plans Branch At Howard U.

The Legal Aid Society announced yesterday that it will open a branch office at the Howard University Law School to enlarge its services in civil cases to indigent persons.

Ernest Schein, president of the Society, said the office will be financed by a 1-year experimental basis by a \$14,000 grant from the Eugene and Agnes E. Meyer Foundation.

Howard officials said the clinic will give law students training and experience in investigation and litigation of civil matters. The students will have the opportunity to do research and prepare memoranda, briefs and pleadings under the supervision of staff attorneys of the Society.

The office will occupy space designed for use as a legal aid clinic when the new law school building was opened in 1958. The main office of the Legal Aid Society is at 805 G. st. nw. Legal Aid officials said its is overcrowded and understaffed.

The new branch, at 6th st. and Howard pl. nw., will be open weekdays from 4 to 6 p. m. and on Saturdays from 10 a. m. until noon. It will be staffed by three attorneys. The Legal Aid Society is a member of the United Givers Fund.

The contract is for \$248,000.



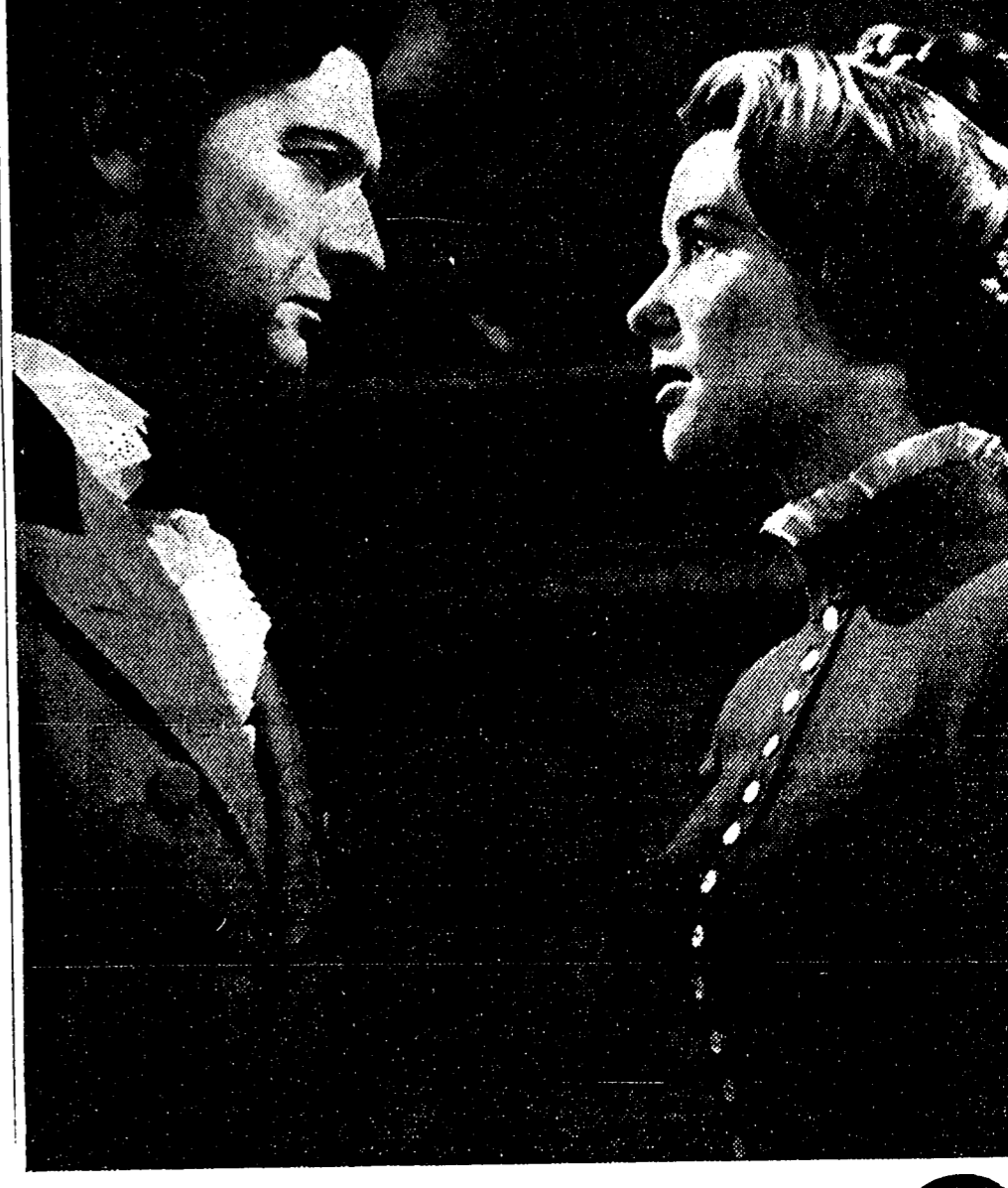
